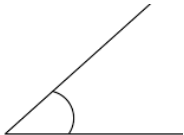

114. Blemish	Definition: a small mark or flaw which spoils the appearance of something. For example skin blemishes are any type of mark, spot, discoloration, or flaw that appears on the skin. Synonyms: Antonyms: perfect, flawless

116. Bloomer	Definition: a serious or stupid mistake or a plant that produces flowers at a specified time Synonyms: error, mistake, blooper Antonyms: correct, perfect, accurate

118. Bolt	Definition: to move suddenly and rapidly or something you use to join two things together usually via a nut (the image has a picture of a bolt and a nut; the bolt is the longer screw-looking one) Synonyms: dash Antonyms: walk 
119. Bound	Definition: walk or run with leaping strides or it could mean a boundary (for example you are bound to fail) or it could be the past tense of bind which means to tie or fasten (something) tightly Synonyms: destined, jump, border, obliged Antonyms: allow, release

126. Budget	Definition: the amount of money free to be spent for a certain period or purpose (e.g. We need to increase our food budget during the winter months). Synonyms: Antonyms: unlimited
127. Buffoon	Definition: a ridiculous but amusing person Synonyms: fool, clown, joker Antonyms: astute, clever , intelligent
128. Bungle	Definition: carry out (a task) clumsily or incompetently (e.g. he bungled his first attempt to manage a group) Synonyms: clumsy Antonyms: useful, successful, capable

129. Burden	Definition: a load, typically a heavy one. Synonyms: load, strain Antonyms: ease, free, calm
130. Cactus	Definition: a desert plant that usually bears spines and lacks leaves Synonyms: Antonyms: 
131. Cad	Definition: a man who behaves dishonourably, especially toward a woman Synonyms: scoundrel, rascal Antonyms: helper, aid, gentlemen
132. Calamity	Definition: a disaster/an event causing great and often sudden damage or distress Synonyms: disaster, catastrophe Antonyms: favour, blessing
133. Canal	Definition: a waterway made by humans for boat transportation or for bringing water to crops Synonyms: Antonyms: 
134. Candid	Definition: truthful and straightforward Synonyms: honest, sincere, frank Antonyms: lying, dishonest
135. Candidate	Definition: a person who is participating in something, usually someone who applies for a job or is nominated for an election Synonyms: contestant, applicant, nominee Antonyms: boss, managers
136. Candour	Definition: to be open and honest Synonyms: truthful, fair, honest, candidness Antonyms: lying, unfair, untruthful

137. Canister	Definition: a small jar or cylinder used to hold or store things Synonyms: Antonyms: 
138. Cannelloni	Definition: a type of pasta dish, rolls of pasta stuffed with a meat or vegetable mixture Synonyms: Antonyms: 
139. Cannon	Definition: a large, heavy gun usually mounted on wheels, formerly used in the war Synonyms: Antonyms: 
140. Canny	Definition: to be careful and clever Synonyms: astute, wise, clever Antonyms: unwise, unskilled, careless
141. Canopy	Definition: a large piece of fabric that is held up by poles and hangs over a space. (e.g. A beautiful lace canopy hangs over her bed) or something high in the air or sky that is spread out over the earth. The top layer of branches and leaves in a rainforest, for example, is called a canopy. Synonyms: cover, shade, umbrella Antonyms: expose, clear, open 
142. Cantaloupe	Definition: a small round melon of a variety with orange flesh and ribbed skin Synonyms: Antonyms: 
143. Canter	Definition: a way a horse moves that resembles but is slower than a gallop (so you can imagine it as a bit like jogging, as galloping is the fastest a horse can go and is like the horse sprinting, and slower than a sprinting is jogging which for a horse is cantering) Synonyms: sprint, run, dash Antonyms: walk, sit
144. Cantor	Definition: a Christian or Jew who leads people in singing or sometimes in prayer, in Judaism it is also called a Hazan Synonyms: Hazan Antonyms:

145. Canvass	Definition: discuss thoroughly (e.g. the issues that were canvassed are still unresolved) Synonyms: debate, discuss Antonyms: stop
146. Capable	Definition: to be able to do something Synonyms: able, suited, competent Antonyms: unable, unintelligent, unskilled
147. Capacious	Definition: having a lot of space inside Synonyms: Roomy, spacious Antonyms: small, tight, compact
148. Capitulate	Definition: to surrender or give up yourself Synonyms: surrender, give in Antonyms: defend, fight
149. Capricious	Definition: given to sudden and strange changes of mood or behaviour (e.g. it's terrible working for a capricious boss) Synonyms: unstable, unpredictable Antonyms: reliable, predictable
150. Captivate	Definition: to attract and hold the interest and attention of something Synonyms: attract, charm, bewitch Antonyms: free, let go
151. Captive	Definition: a person who is captured or a prisoner or an animal that has been confined Synonyms: prisoner Antonyms: free, lose
152. Cardinal	Definition: an official of the Roman Catholic Church (who is chosen by the pope and is second in rank to him) or a North American songbird with a crest of feathers on its head. Synonyms: Antonyms: 

153. Carefree	Definition: to not have to worry or care about things Synonyms: relaxed Antonyms: worried, depressed, anxious
154. Caricature	Definition: a picture, description, or imitation of a person in which certain striking characteristics or key features are exaggerated to create a comic/funny or monstrous effect Synonyms: Antonyms: 
155. Cascade	Definition: a small waterfall with several "steps" or it is a way information is passed on (e.g. the more people that are told the greater the cascade effect) Synonyms: waterfall Antonyms: 
156. Cask	Definition: a large container like a barrel, made of wood, metal or plastic and used for storing liquids, typically alcoholic drinks Synonyms: Antonyms: 
157. Casket	Definition: a small ornamental box or chest for holding jewels, letters or other valuable objects. Or it is a rectangular container used to store bodies like a coffin would Synonyms: Antonyms: 
158. Cast	Definition: (note – there are quite a few definitions for cast depending on the context, but it is not hard to differentiate between them). To cause (light or shadow) to appear on a surface (e.g. the moon cast a pale light over the town). To register (a vote) (e.g. they cast their vote.) When you throw (e.g. the fisherman cast a net in the water). Cause (a magic spell) to take effect (e.g. cast a spell). To shape (metal or other material) by pouring it into a mould while molten. Synonyms: throw, toss, sling Antonyms: keep, catch
159. Catamaran	Definition: a yacht or other boat with twin hulls in parallel Synonyms: Antonyms: 
160. Caution	Definition: care taken to avoid danger or mistakes Synonyms: careful Antonyms: careless, disregard

161. Cautious	Definition: (of a person) being careful to avoid potential problems or dangers Synonyms: wary, careful, vigilant Antonyms: careless, reckless
162. Cease	Definition: to stop or discontinue doing something Synonyms: stop, finish, quit Antonyms: start, begin, continue
163. Celebrate	Definition: : to do something special or enjoyable for an important event, occasion, holiday, etc. Synonyms: party, commemorate Antonyms:
164. Chaos	Definition: complete disorder and confusion Synonyms: disorder, disarray, mayhem, havoc Antonyms: calm, quiet
165. Charade	Definition: an act or pretence meant to create a friendly or respectable appearance. (For example, if someone is only pretending to feel sorry for someone and it is obvious that they are only pretending to feel sorry, their sympathy is a charade.) Synonyms: fake, Farce, pretence Antonyms: truth, honesty, reality
166. Chastise	Definition: to discipline or shout at someone severely for a personal mistake Synonyms: scold, reprimand, chide Antonyms: help, praise, encourage
167. Chide	Definition: to scold or reprimand someone to correct a fault (e.g. she chided him for not replying to her letters) Synonyms: blame, chastise, scold Antonyms: applaud, praise, compliment
168. Chortle	Definition: to laugh in a breathy, gleeful way, like a chuckle Synonyms: laugh, chuckle Antonyms: frown, gloom

169. Chronic	Definition: (of an illness) something that continues for a long time Synonyms: long, continuing, remain Antonyms: leave, shorten, acute
170. Chronicle	Definition: events that are in order of time Synonyms: Antonyms:
171. Circa	Definition: another word for around or about or approximately (e.g. the church was built circa 1935) Synonyms: around, about, near Antonyms: far, away, distant
